Diane Zahm called the meeting to order at 12:02 p.m. A quorum was present.

1. Announcement of approval and posting of minutes of 12/4/24 meeting.

Diane Zahm noted that minutes from the Committee's previous meeting, 12/4/2024, were approved electronically and can be publicly accessed on the Governance Website: governance.vt.edu.

2. Spring Volunteer Timeline Review

Diane Zahm provided a review of volunteer information for Spring Commencement. A call for volunteers for the university ceremony will go out soon. Each college will be asked to provide 3 volunteers:

2 volunteers for the ceremony

1 volunteer for ADA (disability) assistance.

According to Janice Austin, the graduate ceremony will have a different process for recruiting volunteers this year. They will not need marshals from each college. Instead, volunteers will be recruited directly. However, they will still ask for one volunteer from each college to assist with ADA needs. The deadline to sign up for volunteers is May 1st.

3. FAQ Update – ADA Parking Passes

The FAQ page originally stated that SSD would issue handicap parking passes. This will not be the case.

SE had previously offered to print passes, but SSD will not be issuing them. SE is working to simplify the process but does not plan to change it.

Attendees who have a handicap hangtag issued by the DMV will still be able to park in handicap spaces.

4. Commencement Speakers

Eryn Giegel provided an update on the current nominations process for student speakers. Nominations are ongoing, and final decisions will be made after spring break.

Diane Zahm shared that there have been discussions regarding the possibility of giving students a greater voice in the selection process for the spring commencement. The committee is open to receiving nominations, and these would be sent to student organizations early in the academic year.

Kim O'Rourke noted that traditionally, student recommendations are made in the fall. She suggested that it may be beneficial to extend this practice to the spring as well.

Diane Zahm emphasized that the more suggestions received, the better the selection process will be. She also highlighted that this is a valuable opportunity for students to have input into the commencement speaker selection.

The Commencement Keynote Speaker will be announced next week.

6. Special Events Commencement Liaisons

Jessie Richards informed the committee that each college has been assigned an SE coordinator who will act as a liaison for commencement planning. Initial meetings will be scheduled by the SE coordinator through mid-March to kick off the planning process.

7. Other

Commencement Website Updates:

Ginny Wagg requested an update to the verbiage on the commencement website to clarify that the graduate school graduation is only for doctoral and interdisciplinary master's degrees.

Marlena McGlothlin Lester asked for clarification on the locations of the upcoming ceremonies:

- The VTC ceremony will take place at the Jefferson Center.
- The DC graduate school ceremonies will be held at the GMU Center for the Arts.

Annie McCallum made real-time updates to the website during the meeting to reflect these changes.

President of the Faculty Senate's Attendance at Ceremonies:

Rachel Miles requested clarification on which ceremonies the President of the Faculty Senate is expected to attend.

Diane Zahm clarified that the President's attendance is required at both the graduate and university ceremonies, but not at the individual college ceremonies. Additionally, Diane noted that in the past, the President of the Faculty Senate has traveled to DC for the graduate ceremony, as they are the one who carries the mace.

Ginny Wagg recalled that this had not been the case in recent years. After discussion, it was agreed that the decision on whether the President of the Faculty Senate (marshal) should attend the DC graduate ceremony, and the related transportation and logistics, would be left to Ginny Wagg and the graduate school planning committee in DC.

Emergency Management and Disruption Plans:

Chris Bolling from Emergency Management stated that their primary concerns will be about monitoring the weather for the ceremonies in Lane Stadium in the days leading up to the event and keeping track of any changing weather conditions on the day of the ceremonies.

Ciji Good mentioned that disruption plans are being developed to address any potential protests or other disruptions during the ceremonies.
